- c) Critically analyse Judith Wright's comprehensive engagement with environmental and indigenous issues in her poetry, with special reference to 'Bora Ring'.

d) Barbara Baynton's 'The Chosen Vessel' narrates how for women in the bush, life and death is literally at stake. Discuss.

2. Answer any **one** of the following questions:

- a) Could one read Oodgeroo Noonuccal's 'We are Going' as a poem that seeks to scribe belonging on the brink of erasure? Explore.
- b) Critically analyse the integration instead of assimilation model of co-existence between black and white as imagined in Oodgeroo Noonuccal's poem 'Integration Yes!'.
- c) Benang is Kim Scott's attempt at interrogating whiteness in colonial Australia from an aboriginal perspective. Discuss.
- d) Kim Scott's *Benang* "positions Indigeneity, like all identities, as culturally constructed and always in the process of becoming". — Discuss.

3. Answer any **four** of the following short questions:

- a) "And her five cities, like five teeming sores,/ Each drains her:/ a vast parasite robber-state/ Where second hand Europeans pullulate". Explain with reference to the context.
- b) Critically analyse how Judith Wright emphasizes in the 'Bora Ring' that the Aborigine is a mistaken symbol of the primitive evil of the human soul.
- c) "Mother, I won't never go drovin'; blast me if I do". — Why does the bushwoman's boy resolve thus in 'The Drover's Wife'?
- d) Discuss briefly the religious motif in the title 'The Chosen Vessel'.
- e) "Notice of the estate agent reads: 'Rubbish May Be Tipped Here.'"— Explain with reference to the context.
- f) How is the price of survival imaged in 'Integration Yes!'?
- g) "I am no white man"— Discuss how Harley is finally ready to rejoin his people and find his real identity beyond racial constraints in *Benang*.
- h) Briefly comment on how Kim Scott develops the narrative of *Benang* with the negative feelings of "anxiety, anger and betrayal".
